

GETTING STARTED...

- Create a solid committee structure.
- •Set consensus-based expectations of committee commitment.
- Set shared goals.
- •Create internal communication plan.
- •Run a good meeting.





TIPS FOR BUILDING and SUSTAINING STRONG ENERGY COMMITTEES

Identify (achievable) goals and stick to them.

- Review the energy chapter in your town's comprehensive plan to ensure that your town is headed in the right direction.
- Think big, start small!
- Start with manageable projects to lead to relatively near-term success.
- Piggyback on existing campaigns and projects.
- Remember that projects that save money are often well received!

Utilize and build upon people's strengths.





MESSAGING: HOW WE TALK ABOUT ENERGY

- Make your message clear, concise, and compelling.
- Understand and honor what people value.
- •Undertake broad educational events to raise awareness and draw people into your committee.

Create an external communication plan and platform

•Harness various technologies like Facebook, Twitter, Youtube, and personal websites.









Solicit support of town elected officials from the beginning.

- Selectboard or city council members hold the keys to many local actions - budget items, adopting a town resolution, etc.
- Keeping them informed of your efforts, solicit their ideas on your priorities, and set shared goals.





Focus on municipal energy use.

- •Get your elected officials' attention!
- •Identify and execute campaigns to reduce municipal energy use.
- •Offer to help find the funds to undertake these projects.
- •Make it easy for your municipality to undertake energy efficiency projects.



Build broad coalitions and create collaborative opportunities.

- Contact community organizations and institutions to get involved.
- Identify where your interests converge.
- Undertake joint activities.
